

Invest an additional \$190 million dollars in child care:

- **\$90 million** so that no current children lose child care subsidies as NYS implements new health, safety, and quality initiatives mandated by the federal Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG), and
- **\$100 million** to maintain slots
 - \circ in the face of market rate increases due in June of 2016;
 - as New York implements the expanded eligibility rules required by the CCDBG which are effective October 1, 2016, which will provide 12 months of eligibility regardless of income, guaranteed child care for homeless families and payment for absences.

The recently reauthorized federal Child Care and Development Block Grant Act (CCDBG) contains health, safety, and quality requirements. These mandated regulations protect children and increase the safety and quality of New York's child care for working families and their children, but there is a cost.

CCDBG: The costs of implementing only the health and safety components that are federally required will exceed \$90 million in the early years of implementation.¹ The implications of meeting the new requirements while maintaining the number of children served AND the quality of the services provided, are daunting.

Without increased funding, this could translate into a loss of care for tens of thousands of children statewide who are currently being served. New York will need to take significant fiscal, legislative and administrative actions to meet several CCDBG provisions.

The vast majority of children in working families in New York who are eligible for childcare subsidies are unserved due to insufficient funding. Without an increase in the state's investment, parents' ability to provide financial stability for their family and a supportive learning environment for their children is being seriously undermined.

Without taking into account the changes to the subsidy system, simply meeting the increased health and safety requirements of background checks, additional inspections and CPR and first aid training, costs are estimated at approximately \$90 million.
