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Child Care 101: Common Questions & Answers

There is no absolute guarantee of quality in child care programs. However, several factors help to assure high quality care in regulated programs:

Can I just drop in?

Parent Involvement: As a parent, you are a key to quality child care. You have the right to drop in during program hours to observe the program or to see your child. You will probably see the provider often and have a good idea of how things are going in the program.

How many children can a provider care for?

Adult-Child Ratios: Regulated programs must limit the number of children each adult cares for based on regulations. These standards help to make sure that children are properly supervised and get all the attention they need. Each program must post their license or registration. The number of children that can be cared for in the program can be found on the posted license/registration.

Are child care providers required to have a background check?

Background check requirements in New York State for regulated or licensed child care providers, substitutes and assistants:

Does a child care provider need training?

Training and Experience: Regulated child care providers must have experience caring for children. Regulated providers must also receive 30 hours of training in areas such as First Aid/CPR, safety, nutrition, and child abuse prevention every two years.

Who needs to be registered or licensed?

Regulation and Oversight: Programs that care for more than two children three hours or more per day must have a license or registration. The registration or license comes from New York State Office of Children and Family Services.

How often is a child care program inspected?

Inspections: Licensed child care programs are inspected at least once before each license renewal. At least 50% of all registered providers are inspected yearly.

What does Accreditation mean?

Accreditation is another way to judge the quality of a child care program. Family child care homes and child care centers can choose to get accredited by a child care accrediting organization. But, they have to meet higher standards than licensing rules. The program must offer the kind of care, attention, and educational activities parents look for in high-quality child care programs. It must offer activities and experiences that will aid in a child's growth and development and that will help them prepare for school.

Is there a program that will help with the cost of child care?

The child care subsidy program may help eligible families with the cost of child care. In general, families must:

- meet the state's low-income guidelines
- need child care to work
