Thoughts from the Executive Director

Delaware Opportunities is a Community Action Agency with a tri-partite Board of Directors created to help people achieve self-sufficiency and attain a better quality of life. The Board of Directors consists of 1/3 elected officials (or their designees); 1/3 representatives of the public; and 1/3 democratically elected representatives of the low income. The Board develops needs assessments and strategic plans and directs the staff to pursue and operate programs to address the needs of the community.

2019 was an exciting year for Delaware Opportunities. It presented the agency with opportunities with new and expanded services and programs such as taking the reigns of the Mobile Child Advocacy Center, securing funding for an after school program in the Sidney CSD, the start to securing funds for nonemergency non-Medicaid transportation, expanding the Big Buddy program with Coordinators in both Delaware and Otsego Counties, additional Housing programs, and expanded school days in additional Head Start centers. Delaware Opportunities once again hosted Toys for Tots providing toys to almost 500 youth (in addition to other holidays efforts that served another 200 youth and even more seniors) in the county and also hosted a back-to-school initiative providing back-to-school items, sneakers, backpacks, and hygiene supplies again, to almost 500 youth in the county. Delaware Opportunities continues to find opportunities to be at the table for important conversations. In 2019, we have been a part of conversations about transportation, food insecurity, trauma-informed care, substance abuse, child care, healthcare, and many more important topics. These conversations have opened the door to potential new future collaborations and partnerships.

The annual report describes our accomplishments and operations. I will continue to echo the sentiment from the agency's long-time Executive Director, John Eberhard. In a previous annual report, he shared his indebtedness to the Board of

Directors for their guidance. Additionally, I am indebted for their unwavering support as well. Also, I want to thank the very committed and talented staff that give so much of themselves day in and day out so that the residents of Delaware County (and beyond)! Without their commitment and dedication, we would not be who we are today.

I hope you are all as excited as I am to see what 2020 and the next decade has in store for Delaware Opportunities!





Our Programs...

Big Buddy, mentoring programming for at-risk youth in Delaware and Otsego counties that matches youth with a big buddy volunteer.

Car Seat Safety Program, providing education on proper installation and use. Some individuals may be eligible to receive free car seats.

Child Care Resource and Referral, providing technical assistance and training for day care providers to assure quality of care, refer parents to child care resources and train parents what to look for in quality care.

Child and Adult Care Feeding Program, sponsoring the program so that Family and Group Family and Legally Exempt Day Care providers can receive funds to provide nutritious meals and snacks to children in care.

Day Care Registration and Inspection, assisting day care providers to become registered or legally exempt, and conduct health and safety inspections to assure quality of care.

Day Care Subsidies, managing the Department of Social Services financial assistance program for child care for 70 working parents living at or below 125% of poverty.

Developmental Disabilities Services, providing family support services including respite services, after school respite, and parent education and training. Also providing home and community-based services such as day habilitation, community habilitation, waiver respite, and pathway to employment.

Food Bank, supporting a network of 15 food pantries to assure that those without food or money will not go hungry.

Emergency Services, provides assistance to families and individuals faced with emergencies.

Employment and Training, providing pre-employment skill training and support, transportation to and from work, and support for people to seek, find, and maintain employment.

Family Development, assists low income families in creating a goal plan to work towards self sufficiency.

Family Residences, providing foster parents in four agency operated foster homes to serve at-risk adolescents removed from natural parents.

Head Start, serving 224 three and four-year olds in a comprehensive preschool program.

Healthy Families, assuring that 75 families have health care providers and access to other services for best child development.

Home Energy Assistance Program, providing outreach and application assistance for 1,200 households to obtain help in paying heating bills.

Housing Assistance, providing rental assistance, assistance to first-time homebuyers, as well as assistance for home repairs.

Housing Counseling, a HUD approved Housing Counseling Agency providing home buying and foreclosure counseling so that people can purchase and/or maintain a home.

Job Experience and Work Crews, providing an opportunity for public assistance recipients to meet work requirements and learn work skills leading to unsubsidized employment.

Parent Education, assisting 62 parents become more effective in raising their children.

Senior Dining, providing hot noon-time meals for 85,000 meals annually, congregate and home-delivered.

Sexual Assault, providing preventive education and services to 68 victims of sexual assault including a 24/7 hotline, medical and legal accompaniment, counseling and other anonymous services.

SNAP Outreach, identifying families and individuals potentially eligible for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (formerly Food Stamps) and conducting pre-screening to determine probable eligibility.

Transportation, provided to individuals on Medicaid for health related appointments and to senior citizens for medical appointments.

Used Clothing and Household Good, distributing donated clothing and household furnishings, utensils, and other household goods to needy families.

Weatherization, providing energy efficiency measures which drive down the cost of heating and cooling for households in both Delaware and Sullivan Counties.

Women Infants and Children (WIC), providing nutrition education and vouchers for food to assure positive child development for 650 children.



By the Numbers ...

- Provided approximately 87,000 meals through Senior Dining's home-delivered and congregate meal services.
- * 32 youth referred to and enrolled in the Big Buddy program in Delaware and Otsego counties.
- * 250 individuals were eligible and enrolled in SNAP.
- * 210 families in low-income households received services through the Car Seat Safety program.
- * 50 families in Healthy Families demonstrated improved skills related to the adult roles of parents.
- * Provided respite, after school respite, day habilitation and community habilitation services for approximately 95 individuals.
- * Maintained food pantry network for 16 food pantries across the county. Through this network, provided over 200,000 bags of groceries to families.
- * 650 women, infant and children provided with benefits through the WIC program.
- Information and referral was provided to 120 victims of domestic violence and 42 victims of rape and sexual assault.
- * 123 children received child care via child care subsidies, providing families with the ability to maintain affordable child care.
- * Over 600 individuals received transportation services.
- * Provided staffing for four agency operated foster homes, working with 15+ youth.
- * Provided 5,000 units of clothing to low-income households.
- * Supported 110 referrals from DSS for improving parent skills.
- * 30 families were served through the Family Development program.
- * 77 units were completed via the Weatherization program.
- * 7,560 rental vouchers were provided through the Rental Assistance program.
- * Over 200 children were served through the Head Start program.

Coming Up in 2020...

Delaware Opportunities administration have been a part of, and will continue to be, conversations and task forces focused on transportation, trauma-informed care, Census, substance use, mental health, housing, etc. DO's Executive Director and Deputy Director were chosen to be a part of Cornell Cooperative Extension's ACEs Task Force "Trauma-Informed Champion" project. This research project, with the University of Buffalo, kicks-off in March 2020.

Delaware Opportunities has started to seek out funding to support non-emergency, non-Medicaid transportation. Eligibility will be connected to the Social Determinants of Health, and as such, can support individuals who need to get to appointments, the grocery store, work, etc. Some modest funding was secured in 2019 and additional efforts will take place in 2020.

Delaware Opportunities, as the co-chair for the county's Census Complete Count Committee, will continue to lead the charge in Census outreach efforts across the county heading into the 2020 Census. Delaware Opportunities has prequalified as a non-profit partner for the county for funding coming from NYS for these efforts. DO also hosts an internal Complete Count Committee that will continue to meet throughout 2020 to brainstorm and implement strategies for best ensuring a complete count with clients served by the agency.

Three Delaware Opportunities' staff enrolled to become candidates to become Certified Community Action Professionals. This intense program includes a series of steps that must be completed to achieve this prestigious designation, culminating with a test. Candidates have three years to complete the certification process. Delaware Opportunities' Senior Management continue to develop a revised Emergency Response Plan as well as create a Risk Management Action Plan to address items identified in the 2019 Risk Assessment Report.

Delaware Opportunities' Leadership Institute pilot kicked off in January 2020 and will continue for the next five months. The pilot program will be evaluated upon completion and a determination will be made about whether to continue it in the future or not. LI participants are currently working on a project to develop a new idea for a service of some sort that connects to the agency mission. They will present their ideas at the end of the program, with one idea being chosen for actual implementation.

Delaware Opportunities will be upgrading both its phone system and website in 2020. More to come!

There are several new ideas for programs and services in the works. As gaps in services are identified, DO has committed itself to being a part of brainstorming and strategic planning to address those areas of need.





Our 200 staff and 250 volunteers were dedicated to serving the residents of Delaware County (and in some cases Otsego and Sullivan Counties as well).
